Précis

This report describes the Regulatory activity for the reporting period 27 February 2018 to 9 April 2018.

2. Biosecurity

2.1. Freshwater Biosecurity

The Check Clean Dry campaign is now complete. In addition to the day to day activities of advocates work, the following major events were attended with points set up to ensure boats were cleaned and free of Lagarosiphon at Cromwell before going to Glenorchy, or via the use of decontamination stations set up for the competitors to be able to decontaminate their wetsuits.

- International Jet Boating Sprints October 2017
- Lakes Hayes Triathlon 27 December 2017
- Lake Dunstan Triathlon 2 January 2018
- Old4New Life Jacket Swap Events Wanaka 7 January 2018, Clyde and Cromwell 8 January 2018, and Queenstown 9 January 2018.
- Ruby Island (Lake Wanaka) Swim 27 January 2018
- Challenge Wanaka 17 February 2018
- Macpac Motatapu 10 March 2018

While the advocates were undertaking their work, as part of the CCD national programme, advocates nationwide were requested to undertake a survey of as many water users as possible. In Otago, 471 surveys were completed. The survey questions and results are included as Appendix 1 with this report.

2.2. Rabbits – RHDV-1 K5 Operational roll-out

RHDV1 K5 has now been released at around 100 sites throughout Otago. Prior to the releases two prefeed's of carrot were carried out to get the rabbits onto the bait. The releases of carrot laced with K5 were made from 12 March through to 20 March.

Staff have been collecting samples from dead rabbits and have sent these for analysis to confirm the presence of K5 in the wild rabbit population. The first case of RHDV1 K5 in New Zealand has been confirmed and the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) have been formally notified, this sample was from an Otago site.

Monitoring of sites for dead rabbits will continue for the next few weeks with population counts planned for mid to late May. We are hearing of varying results from the K5 virus, however these reports are anecdotal at this stage and we expect to have more robust data post the planned counts.

2.3. Wallaby activity

- 27 February 2018 Wallaby Destroyed near Ranfurly

- 6 March 2018 Luggate Cromwell Highway inspection showed that that it was not a wallaby
- 15 March 2018 Eweburn Ranfurly reporting of two wallabies. Inspection resulted in nothing being located.
- 18 March 2018 Buster Road Naseby report of one wallaby Inspection resulted in nothing being located.

 2 April 2018 – Mount Stalker inland from Herbert in North Otago – under investigation.

To increase wallaby publicity, signs are now being erected at popular hunting places in Central Otago.

3. Compliance activity

Over this reporting period, 44 consent audits have been conducted. The majority were for water permits. Three water permit holders received abatement notices and one received an infringement notice as a result of the audits for breach of consent limits and failing to supply data.

There are currently 1,942 water permits greater than 5l/s. All of these permits require metering under the Water measuring regulations. Of these, 190 are yet to install measuring. These consents have lapse dates ranging from September 2018 through to November 2026 for the consent holder to give effect to their consent. All consent holders who have not yet installed measuring will be issued with Abatement Notices in the coming weeks prohibiting the abstraction of any water under their consent (water can still be taken under the permitted activity rules), until measuring is installed and they are fully compliant with the Regulations. It is expected that a number of these permits will be surrendered as they are not in use/not able to be used but have a perceived value to the property.

Water take records are due for submission by 31 July annually. A large number of consent holders are now sending in daily data via telemetry to the Council which makes assessment with consent limits timely. In the past, there had been issues with some third-party data service providers failing to provide adequate services to their clients. Examples included failing to download dataloggers in a timely manner and provide the data to the ORC (by 31 July), failing to address telemetry issues in a timely manner when devices stopped transmitting, resulting in loss of data and the ability to assess compliance, and failing to provide an adequate verification/maintenance service, particularly for open channel water takes.

Consents which had datalogger issues last season and were unable to provide their water take data and are experiencing similar issues this season and therefore not able to provide data, may be put up for a review to have the frequency with which they are required to download data increased or require the holder to install telemetry. This will ensure Council is provided with timely and accurate data.

4. Environmental Risk Assessment programme

Currently 485 desktop assessments of properties 2-10Ha have been conducted. These include assessments for the Shag Catchment, and others in the Waitaki District area. The tender for the pilot study in the Shag Catchment for properties greater than 10Ha (204 properties in the Shag Catchment) has been granted, and work towards this has commenced.

Desktop assessments (properties 2-10Ha) consider the geophysical attributes of the property, including soil drainage, slope, nitrogen leaching risk, whether there are waterways on the property and the order (size) of the waterway, whether there are constructed drains and where these go to, and the water quality for the catchment that the property is located within.

The pilot study in the Shag catchment, for larger properties, is aimed at engaging, educating and encouraging the uptake of good management practices to achieve improved water quality outcomes. It is hoped that through discussions about how the Water Plan works and what it means for the landowner, people will identify changes that may need to be made to the way their property is managed in the future to help maintain Good Water in Otago.

11.2. Consents and Building Control

1. Précis

This report covers consents and building control, and deemed permit replacement progress for the period 23 February to 6 April 2018.

2. Consent Processing

2.1. Public Notification

RM17.229 Peter Graham – to place a pontoon in, and occupy the CMA at Vauxhall. This is a proposal for a golf hole-in-one activity and is a joint process with the Dunedin City Council. At the close of submissions there were 18 submissions made to both Councils; 6 in support, 2 neutral and 10 opposing. The hearing was on 19 February and the Hearing Panel requested further information of the applicant which was received on 6 April. The information is being sent to submitters for comment, and the applicant will then have time to comment. A decision is pending.

2.2. Limited Notification

There are nine applications under limited notification that are being processed at present.

2.3. Objections

There are two applications where costs have been objected to. Correspondence with the objectors is underway. If hearings are required, this will be set up. There is one objection to consent conditions from the DCC and it is being processed.

2.4. Appeals

2.4.1. RM17084 Kyeburn

Application for deemed permit replacements went to a hearing on 23 June 2017. The consents were granted and have been appealed by Otago Fish and Game. Kati Huirapa Runaka ki Puketeraki and Te Runanga o Otakou have joined the proceedings as interested parties under s274 of the RMA. Court assisted mediation on 20 October 2017 resulted in the mediation being suspended while the parties consider options. Reporting back was required by 22 December 2017, and this date has been extended three times and is now 20 April 2018. Since 2017 amended consent conditions have been circulating between parties. There has also been the development of a freshwater fish management plan outside of the consent conditions.

3. Deemed Permit Replacement.

The Water Plan promotes the replacement of deemed permits and other water permits that expire in 2021, to be held by water management groups. This project implements the Plan policies.

A focus of the project is to meet with clusters of deemed permit holders based on catchments, in order to outline the steps required for deemed permit replacement and encouragement to form water management groups.

370 deemed water permits remain. In 2014 there were 458; therefore the number is decreasing slowly. A number of groups are working with consultants to gather information for preparation of replacement consent applications. 16 of the 26 permits being replaced in the Lindis catchment which had direct deferral to the Environment

Court are deemed permits. There are 24 deemed permits being replaced in the Kyeburn catchment, currently under appeal.

A presentation was given to the Dunedin property lawyers of the local Law Society on 8 March. A short paper on the benefits of group water management is being given at the Irrigation NZ Conference mid-April in Alexandra.

A contractor has begun work on undertaking fish surveys in streams where such information is poor or absent. So far there has been good cooperation from landowners in allowing access to do this work.
